Council Approves Sheriff's 2026 Pay Matrix After Contract Dispute

The Scott County Council voted to approve Sheriff Jerry Goodin's pay matrix for 2026 following a debate over whether the scale constitutes a long-term contractual obligation. Council President JR Ward said the council had not committed to raises

during budget talks due to revenue uncertainty, but recent discussions about employee pay made it appropriate to revisit the sheriff's request. Ward stressed the approval applies only to the 2026 calendar year and does not bind future councils.

Goodin argued a prior court order referenced a 20-year matrix structure and said deputies deserve consistent, career-based pay. Council members disagreed on the interpretation but acknowledged the county previously spent about \$130,000 in legal fees over the issue and expressed interest in avoiding further litigation.

After clarifying that deputies will advance one step on the scale in 2026 based on years of service, the council approved the matrix for one year. Officials said future implementation beyond 2026 will be left to the next sheriff and council.

Scott County Council Approves \$32,013 Increase for Coroner's Office

The Scott County Council approved \$32,013.24 in additional funding for the Scott County Coroner's Office following an extended discussion with Coroner Jonathan White about staffing, equipment and operational needs.

White initially requested larger increases, including raises for deputy

coroners, additional staffing, training funds, and operational expenses. Council members negotiated several line items downward, citing budget constraints while acknowledging improvements made within the office.

The approved funding includes increases for deputy coroner pay, part-time assistance, office supplies, medical waste services, training, travel, equipment, technology subscriptions, and combined fuel and vehicle maintenance.

A requested longevity increase was removed from the proposal.

White told council members the office had not seen significant budget adjustments in more than a decade and emphasized the need for updated equipment, proper training, and compliant medical waste disposal. Council members praised his efforts to modernize the office but stressed the need for gradual financial increases rather than immediate full funding.

Council Approves \$21,702 for Prosecutor's Axon Software

The Scott County Council approved funding for a new digital evidence management program to be used by the Scott County Prosecutor's Office. Chief Deputy Prosecutor Amanda Herald attended the meeting on behalf of Prosecutor Chris Owens, who was unable to be present. Herald outlined the office's plan to implement software from Axon that allows prosecutors to review, redact, transcribe and share body camera footage and other digital evidence.

Herald said the \$21,702 annual cost for 2026 will be fully covered by prosecutor-controlled funds, includ-

ing pre-trial diversion funds, infraction deferral funds and proceeds from a recent state forfeiture tied to an interstate investigation.

"This year it was paid for in full by the prosecutor's office from our funds," Herald said. "But going forward, we may need to request that it be included in the general fund budget." She explained that while Scott County's local law enforcement agencies do not currently use body cameras, the Indiana State Police does, and additional agencies could adopt the technology in the future. The Axon platform would allow prosecutors to directly access body camera footage, police reports, photos and videos, make court-required redactions without altering original files, and share materials to comply

with discovery obligations.

The software also includes transcription services, which Herald said will improve efficiency and trial preparation by helping attorneys accurately review lengthy recordings.

Council members confirmed the contract is structured as a year-to-year agreement, with a locked-in price expected to remain stable for up to 10 years through a discounted rate negotiated statewide by the Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys Council.

Council members approved three related appropriations totaling \$21,702 — \$10,000 from the pre-trial diversion fund, \$1,702 from the infraction deferral fund and \$10,000 from a law enforcement forfeiture fund.

Scott County Council approves 3% raises, launches pay study

The Scott County Council voted to move forward with a two-part salary classification study and approved a 3% raise for most county employees following extended discussion.

Under old business, council members revisited earlier conversations about employee pay and the need for updated job classifications. Council leadership reported discussions with consulting firm Waggoner Irwin Scheele about conducting a comprehensive job classification and compensation study. The last such review was completed in 2008.

Originally estimated at around \$50,000 to evaluate all county positions, the proposal was restructured into two phases to spread out costs. Phase one, priced at \$33,520, will focus primarily on administrative and clerical courthouse staff. The review will examine job descriptions, ensure compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act, confirm exempt and non-exempt classifications, and assign positions a point-factor rating to establish recommended pay ranges. Phase two, estimated at \$22,340, would evaluate remaining departments beginning in January 2027.

Council members expressed concern

that without updated classifications, the county could face wage and labor complaints if employees performing similar duties are paid significantly different rates. The firm would also provide representation if disputes arise from its recommendations.

Following discussion, the council voted to approve phase one and enter into a letter of engagement with the firm, with work expected to begin March 1 and conclude by summer.

After a brief recess, the council turned to employee raises. Auditor Jennifer Hamelman presented cost breakdowns for a 3% across-the-board increase for eligible employees. Some departments—including Community Corrections and EMS—were excluded because they are funded primarily through grants or self-generated revenue and indicated they could not support additional increases. The Health Department was also excluded, having previously received adjustments tied to state funding initiatives.

The 3% raises, effective retroactively to Jan. 1, 2026, required more than 40 individual additional appropriation ordinances across multiple funds, including general fund, highway, 911, probation, prosecutor, auditor, clerk, treasurer and other offices. Council members moved through each ordinance in succession, approving nearly all by unanimous votes.

Highway Department raises were approved across several funding streams,

despite discussion about potential comparisons with neighboring counties and long-term funding impacts. Probation offices—whose base salaries are set by the state but paid locally—were also included in the increase.

The public defender's raise was tabled pending confirmation, as the current officeholder has previously declined county-funded increases. Soil and Water Conservation funding was also tabled for clarification.

During public comment, court employees noted they remain among the lowest-paid in surrounding counties, citing differences of several dollars per hour. Council members acknowledged disparities but emphasized the county's limited tax base and revenue constraints. Officials said the upcoming classification study will examine tenure, compensation packages and regional comparisons, though recommendations will remain subject to budget limitations.

Council members also discussed broader financial concerns, including the potential impact of future state legislative changes and the possibility of a wheel tax tied to county road funding, though no action was taken on that issue.

In closing, council leadership said the combination of the 3% raise and the upcoming professional study represents a first step toward a more structured and defensible compensation system for county employees.

Scott County Commissioners address grants, road projects and administrative matters at regular meeting

The Scott County Commissioners handled a wide range of business at their regular meeting, including grant fund creation, highway planning, board appointments and discussion of a potential new code enforcement position.

The board first amended the agenda to allow representatives of the Scott County Young Marines to speak after they were inadvertently left off the printed agenda. William Neace requested permission to use the Scott County Health Department parking lot on April 11 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. for a car and bike show fundraiser. Officials confirmed the group carries insurance coverage and that the event would not conflict with scheduled health department activities, including its monthly pet food giveaway. Commissioners unanimously approved the request. Commissioners then approved Ordinance No. 1 establishing a dedicated grant fund for the Scott County Health Department to administer CIPI Head Generator System grant funds. Officials noted the ordinance allows the department to properly receive and track grant revenue while continuing efforts to bridge funding gaps through outside sources.

A representative from the Children's Advocacy Center followed up on a previously approved \$15,000 allocation from opioid settlement funds. While there had been earlier confusion regarding whether the funding would come from restricted or unrestricted accounts, commissioners confirmed the resolution remains in place and the amount is unchanged as it proceeds through the required approval process. During highway department remarks, discussion turned to road plates

delivered from the City of Jeffersonville to the county highway garage. A commissioner Randy Julian stated no interlocal agreement had been executed for the transfer of equipment, which is typically required when government entities share materials. The matter, along with allegations of "ghost employment" involving Council President JR Ward, was referred to the Indiana State Police for investigation. Julian stated the referral was made to ensure Scott County is "clear of any wrongdoing." The road plates remain at the county garage pending retrieval arrangements.

Highway officials also presented 2026 annual bid figures. Plans call for approximately 14.4 miles of chip seal work at an estimated cost of about \$178,000. For comparison, a two-inch asphalt overlay on the same mileage would exceed \$750,000, a difference of more than \$579,000. Commissioners approved all annual bids and discussed the recent purchase of a used 10,000-gallon brine tank for winter operations, acquired through an online government surplus auction for approximately \$1,100 plus transportation costs.

Additional business included appointing Lisa Baker to fill a vacancy on the county Visitors Commission and approving Ordinance No. 2 creating a SEED grant fund for the Scott County Emergency Management Department.

The board also introduced a county code enforcement officer position. Commissioners said the role would focus on health, safety and ordinance compliance issues rather than neighborhood preference disputes. The proposal would potentially add enforcement duties through the health department, with a workshop meeting expected to further define responsibilities, enforcement procedures and implementation details.

A Journey of a Lifetime: The Good News Series: Volume 3, No. 01 by Marcus Amos - Amos Publishing, LLC

Welcome to this week's column of The Good News - A Journey of a Lifetime Volume 3 No. 1. This week we are going to learn that the best way and truly the only way to live our lives is to follow the word of God.

Jesus Says No to Temptation (Matthew 4:1-11)

4:1 Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted[a] by the devil.

2 After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry.

3 The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread."

4 Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'"

5 Then the devil took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple.

6 "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written: 'He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone.'"

7 Jesus answered him, "It is also written: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'"

8 Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor.

9 "All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me."

10 Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'"

11 Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

Perhaps one of the best-known passages of the Bible is Matthew 4:1-11, where the Spirit leads Jesus into the wilderness to be tempted by the Devil. The account has everything: drama, suspense and conflict on a cosmic scale. We read that passage with a palpable sense of the universe hanging in the balance.

Most often I hear Matthew 4 preached as an example of how to overcome temptation in the Christian life. To be sure, it teaches us much about temptation and resistance. Occasionally I hear preachers and Christians turn to this passage and debate whether it was possible for Jesus to sin. What interests me today is how Jesus read the Bible in His struggle with Satan's devices. Note how Jesus read His Bible in a God centered way.

First, Jesus hangs on every word of God. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (verse 4). The words of God's mouth are the bread of Jesus' life. Every word. Not a few words. Not the words particularly easy to accept. Not the words that make Him popular. Our Lord Jesus read the Bible in order to live by every pronouncement His Father made. He understood that the words on His scroll were words that "come from the mouth of God."

Second, Jesus read the word in order to trust God, not test God. "Again it is written, 'You shall not put the Lord your God to the test'" (verse 7). The Lord found in the Scriptures reason to believe God, to rely on Him. Facing Satan's temptation, he knew there was a significant difference between trusting God and testing God. One humbles itself under the word of God; the other humbles the word under our desires. Jesus never sought to stand above God's word—always below it, in obedience to it, gladly. He trusted the Father as the word of God called Him to do so.

Third, Jesus read the word to clarify that God alone is God, to worship God properly. "Then Jesus said to him, 'Be gone, Satan! For it is written, "You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve"' (verse 10). It's possible to hear God's word while listening to and serving our idols. Isn't that what Satan was doing as he quoted the Scripture and asked Jesus to worship him? But not Jesus. He read the Bible as an act of worship. He found in the Bible reason to worship God alone. No rivals. No counterfeits. No idols. No exceptions. He purposed to serve the Father only. He read the word in order to bow to God. This is why the Devil leaves him in verse 11. There was nothing in Christ that could be satanically used to draw Him away from the true worship of the Father in order to trust anyone or anything else.

Until recently, I don't think I'd ever recognized just how God-focused Jesus was in this passage. The Lord's ears were glued to God's mouth (verse 4). His hopes rested on God's heart (verse 7). His service belonged to God's throne (verse 10). Each time the Lord applied the Scripture He actually applied himself to God.

Watching Jesus use the Scripture in Matthew 4 reminds me of several things I need to observe in my own Bible reading.

1. I need to learn to hang on every word of God. How often we find ourselves debating which parts of

scripture apply? Yet it seems Jesus would have us debate not if they apply but how they apply. The if is settled. God speaks; we heed. Indeed, we ought to hang on every word, awaiting the life that comes from it. I too often read the Bible with an "I've read this before" or "I know what this says" attitude. I find it difficult to "hear again for the first time" and I find it all too easy to skim the words on the page in distraction. So I need to pray—more than I do—"Holy Spirit, let this next word be life to me! Let me feed on it like bread! Let me hear it as a word straight from the mouth of God!"

2. I need to recognize how critical to sanctification knowledge of God's word is. Jesus lives by every word of God. His reading translated into His living. That was critical in our Savior's temptation. Thus He was able to use a three-fold strategy for resisting demonic temptation: (1) Hide God's word in your heart so you can live by it; (2) Trust God completely so you don't take matters into your own hands; and, (3) worship the Lord God alone so you can refuse all idolatry.

3. I must give careful attention to proper interpretation. Have you ever noticed that Jesus was the first to quote scripture in this encounter with Satan (verse 4)? Then Satan follows up with a subtle twisting of God's word. Perhaps the Enemy would have been content to leave God's word out of the temptations had not the Lord raised it. But when Jesus quotes the Scripture, the Adversary felt certain he could overthrow our Lord even on biblical grounds! He must certainly feel confident he can do that with us. When we endeavor to live by the word of God we face the temptation of distorted, self-serving misinterpretation. That temptation was not in Jesus, but it is in us. So I'm reminded of just how vital careful interpretation is.

In a more simplified explanation, in the game of Simon Says, we do what Simon says to do, but in real life we should do what the Bible tells us to do. There was a time in the Bible when God's enemy, the devil, tried to trick Jesus into doing something He knew was wrong, but Jesus didn't fall for it because Jesus knew what the Bible says.

Sometimes the devil wants to trick us, too. Like if someone hurts us...the Bible tells us not to hurt others back, but the devil wants us to think it's okay because they hurt us first. We can tell the devil, "I don't hurt back because I follow the Bible!" Or if we accidentally break something...the Bible says to tell the truth, but the devil might want us to think it's better to hide it so we don't get into trouble. We can tell the devil, "I tell the truth because I follow the Bible!"

When the devil tried to trick Jesus, He told the devil, the Bible tells me to do something different! I follow the Bible!

Prayer: Dear God, help us do what Jesus did. Help us do what the Bible tells us to do instead of listening to what the devil wants us to do. In Jesus' name, amen.

The Scott County Visitors Commission approved its monthly financial report and two invoices during its recent meeting.

The commission reported a beginning balance of \$662,742.47, with \$27,212.07 in receipts and \$15,553.04 in expenditures, leaving an ending balance of \$674,401.50 as of the 29th. Receipts included innkeeper's tax revenue as well as two transferred checks and \$1,000 designated for the community scarecrow contest. The financial report was approved unanimously.

Commissioners also approved payment to FTP Gibbons for a one-time consultation regarding a potential amphitheater project in Scottsburg. The firm, which has experience with an amphitheater project in Franklin, provided preliminary cost estimates ranging

from approximately \$700,000 to \$2 million.

Officials said the invoice reflects the final payment for the consultation.

A second invoice from J&C Printing for tourism flyers distributed to local hotels and restaurants was also approved.


