Borden Lady Braves Heading to the State Finals after 65-26 semi-state win over Greenwood Christian Academy Cougars

The Borden Lady Braves made it to the championship game of the 1A IHSAA Semi-State held at Charlestown High School, as they went to battle against the Greenwood Christian Academy Cougars.

The tip-off started at 8 p.m. with Borden taking control of the ball. Both teams took bounced back and forth with the ball during the first two minutes of the first quarter, making attempts to make a basket, but were unsuccessful in doing so. It wasn't until the 5 minute mark, when Borden scored a three-pointer, and quickly after, Borden's AJ Mallad scored a two-pointer followed by a time-out at 4:21 in the first quarter, bringing the score to 5-0, Lady Braves lead. A free-throw was made by Greenwood Christian Academy, making their first point of the game. Borden came back with a three-pointer 8-1 at the 3 minute mark. At the 2 minute mark GCA scored a three-pointer, making it 10-4. Borden then shot a two-pointer with around 1:30 left on the clock for the first quarter. At 1:05, GCA hit another free-throw shot, bringing the score to 12-5, Borden leading.

At 26.3 seconds, Emma Hart scored 2 points at the free-throw line for Borden, bringing the end of the first quarter, 14-5, with the Lady Braves having a nine-point lead.

In the second quarter, the Borden Lady Tigers started off with a two-pointer, making the score 16-5. Emma Hart scored another basket, bring the Lady Braves 18-5.

At 6:34, Riley Rarick scored two at

the free-throw line, making it 20-5, Borden lead. Riley came back at 6:05 shooting a three-pointer with Borden having a 18-point lead, 23-5.

As the second quarter went on, Borden and GCA ran back and forth scoring a few two-pointers battling it out on the floor, during the five minute range. GCA's Annani Stoltz shot a three-pointer 29-10 in the three-minute range on the clock, followed by another three-pointer by Borden, bringing the score to 32-10.

GCA scored a two-point basket at the 2 minute mark on the clock, putting the game at 32-12. Then at 1:10 Borden scored another basket, bringing the score to 34-12.

In the final seconds of the second quarter, Borden was in control of the ball, attempting to score, when Ava Wheeler was fouled and went up to the free-throw line to shoot 1 of 2 successfully at 7 seconds. Borden and GCA went into the locker rooms as the Lady Braves had a 23-point lead (35-12).

At the start of the second half, Borden's Riley Rarick scored a three-pointer within the first 15 seconds At 5:49, the score was 42-12, with the Lady Braves, scoring two more baskets.

At 5:10, GCA was able to score two points, putting the score at 42-14. Borden leading. At 3:30 Ava Wheeler scored a 3-pointer for 45-14. With 3:14 in the third quarter, GCA's Norah Herndon scored two points from the free-throw line bringing the score to 45-16, with a 29 point lead for the Lady Braves. At 2:55, Borden scored another three-pointer, 48-16, Lady Braves in the lead.

The girls were doing good on both sides, trying to make some

points during the 2 minute mark on the clock, but wasn't able to until Borden's Riley Rarick was fouled and she scored two points bringing them to a 34 point lead 50-16 over the Cougars of GCA.

With less than a minute on the clock, Borden scored two points, after trying to make several unsuccessful shots. Then at the buzzer, Borden's A.J. Mallad scored the last basket of the third quarter, 55-16, Borden leading.

Fourth quarter action seemed to have both teams more focused and getting some points. The score was 61-21 with 6:25 left on the clock.

Shelby Thornbury scored a basket at 3:45 bringing the score to 63-23. GCA's Nadiyah Konecky shot a three-pointer for GCA at 1:30 left in the fourth quarter, 65-26.

In the final seconds, Borden was in control of the ball, but was not able to score, but won the game, 65-26, being named the IHSAA 1A Semi-State Girls Basketball Champions at Charlestown High School.

Borden's leading scorer was Riley Rarick with 25 points, followed by Emma Hart with 10, AJ Mallad with 8, followed by Ava Wheeler and Saylor Schleich with 7 and McKenna Mullen and Shebi Thornbury, both with 4

Greenwood's top scorers were Annani Stoltz with six, Kate Reed with five, Nora Herndon with 4, Myria Finitny with 3, and Molly Hunter and Kaylee Edgar with 2 Nadiyah Konecky with 3.

The Borden Lady Braves will be heading to Gainbridge Arena in Indianapolis on Saturday, February 28, to compete in the IHSAA Girls State Basketball Championship.

Charlestown Sanitary Sewer Board Celebrates Launch of New Wastewater Plant

The Charlestown Sanitary Sewer Board earlier this month at City Hall, marking a milestone moment for the city's wastewater system as officials announced that flow has officially begun at the new treatment plant. The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and approval of the agenda, minutes from the Jan. 15 meeting, current claims, and payroll docket. All items passed unanimously.

During the operator's report, Utilities Director Tim Crawford announced what he called "exciting news" — wastewater is now flowing through the new plant, and the administration building is operational. "It's been a busy week, but a very good week," he said. While minor adjustments are still being worked out, no major issues have arisen. Officials expected to reach the plant's physical outfall later that morning, at which point the new operating permit would take effect, making the transition fully official.

Board members expressed

enthusiasm about the long-anticipated project coming online.

The board also approved Contract Amendment No. 2 with JTL Engineering for \$25,000 to develop an asset management plan for the Water Resource Facility (WRF). The plan is required under the State Revolving Fund (SRF) funding mechanism tied to the plant expansion project. The amendment passed unanimously, with the board attorney noting only minor cosmetic revisions.

In additional business, members approved an annual conflict-of-interest agreement allowing city employee Clifford "Cliff" Shrimp to continue mowing grass at the plant and lift stations on his own time using personal equipment. Officials noted the arrangement mirrors last year's agreement and ensures transparency, as the work is performed outside regular city hours and without city resources.

The board also approved a single charge-off in the amount of \$512.

Indiana's First PFAS Drinking Water Treatment System Debuts in Charlestown

Indiana American Water marked a major milestone in water quality and public health with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at its Charlestown water treatment plant, unveiling Indiana's first drinking water treatment system specifically designed to remove per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as PFAS.

The nearly \$6 million treatment system, which went online last month, represents a significant step forward in addressing emerging contaminants and ensuring safe, reliable drinking water for the Charlestown community. According to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM), this is the first PFAS treatment installation in a public water system anywhere in the state.

PFAS are a group of manufactured chemicals that have been used for decades in a wide range of industrial and consumer products. Often referred to as "forever chemicals," they are known for their persistence in the environment and have been linked to potential health risks, prompting increased regulatory attention nationwide.

"We are proud to partner with Indiana American Water on this important project," said Charlestown Mayor Treva Hodges during the ceremony. "Access to high-quality drinking water is essential for the health and well-being of our community, and this new treatment system shows a forward-thinking approach to community safety. Continued improvements to our water system have helped Charlestown achieve a higher quality of life and have spurred community growth, making our city an even more attractive place to live and invest."

The official ribbon-cutting ceremony was held January 29, and drew local officials, community leaders, and representatives from Indiana American Water to celebrate the achievement.

"This investment underscores our continued commitment to delivering safe, clean, and reliable water to our customers," said Barry Suits, President of Indiana

on income, but access to quality care often does," Romer said. "Thanks to Duke Energy Foundation's investment in our community, we can bridge that gap and provide professional, compassionate care to those who might otherwise go without help."

PCS operates as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, with a significant portion of its clients identified as at-risk or marginalized. The organization partners with local schools, churches, municipalities and community agencies to address mental health needs throughout the region.

Charlestown Board of Public Works Approves Events and Grants

The City of Charlestown Board of Public Works approved several upcoming events and contracts.

A partnership with Charles Town Ensembles was approved for a musical camp scheduled June 8-12 at the city's Arts and Enrichment Building. The organization will handle all registrations and fees, while the city will provide the facility. Approval was unanimous.

The board also approved a \$10,000 contract for The Crashers to headline Founders Day on June 18, 2027. Officials noted the local band will not require hotel accommodations and that sponsorships typically offset entertainment costs.

Members granted permission for Backyard Classics to host its 28th annual car show on the city square June 27, 2026, pending a correction to its certificate of insurance to reflect the proper event date. No city funds will be exchanged for the event.

The board approved a request to formally vacate any potential interest in decades-old easements near Old Thompson Street connected to the Jennings Groves development area. Officials said the easements are not reflected on GIS records and appear to contain no utilities.

Additionally, the city accepted a \$5,000 "Small Town, Big Trees" grant through the Indiana Department of Natural Resources to plant 28 mature trees at parks and public spaces including City Square, Greenway Park and the Family Activities Park. The contract was awarded to Lincoln Springs Tree Farm for \$4,500, with volunteer labor contributing toward the grant's match requirement.

The board also approved a \$20.52 sanitation charge-off and discussed seeking reimbursement from Spectrum after a December service outage at a concession stand prevented credit card transactions and resulted in lost revenue.

Marvin Wright Conservation Scholarship Applications are Due March 1

Clark County students pursuing careers in environmental and conservation-related fields can now apply for the Marvin Wright Conservation Scholarship, a \$2,800 award administered through the Community Foundation of Southern Indiana. The scholarship is available to current high school seniors as well as current college students who are entering or already enrolled in an environmental science-related program at a post-secondary institution, including both two-year and four-year colleges. Applicants must be residents of Clark County. Fields of study eligible for consideration include, but are not limited to, horticulture,

landscape architecture, agriculture, environmental engineering, forestry, agronomy, environmental studies, geology, and wildlife biology.

The scholarship is supported by the Marvin Wright Conservation Endowment Fund and is intended to encourage and assist students who plan to dedicate their education and careers to environmental stewardship and conservation. Applications must be submitted online by March 1, 2026. Additional information and application materials are available at ClarkSWCD.org.

A Journey of a Lifetime: The Good News Series

Welcome to this week's column of The Good News - A Journey of a Lifetime Volume 3 No. 1. This week we are going to learn that the best way and truly the only way to live our lives is to follow the word of God.

Jesus Says No to Temptation (Matthew 4:1-11)

4:1 Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted[a] by the devil.

2 After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry.

3 The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread."

4 Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'"

5 Then the devil took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple.

6 "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written: 'He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone.'"

7 Jesus answered him, "It is also written: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'"

8 Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor.

9 "All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me."

10 Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'"

11 Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

Perhaps one of the best-known passages of the Bible is Matthew 4:1-11, where the Spirit leads Jesus into the wilderness to be tempted by the Devil. The account has everything: drama, suspense and conflict on a cosmic scale. We read that passage with a palpable sense of the universe hanging in the balance.

Most often I hear Matthew 4 preached as an example of how to overcome temptation in the Christian life. To be sure, it teaches us much about temptation and resistance. Occasionally I hear preachers and Christians turn to this passage and debate whether it was possible for Jesus to sin. What interests me today is how Jesus read the Bible in His struggle with Satan's devices. Note how Jesus read His Bible in a God centered way.

First, Jesus hangs on every word of God. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (verse 4). The words of God's mouth are the bread of Jesus' life. Every word. Not a few words. Not the words particularly easy to accept. Not the words that make Him popular. Our Lord Jesus read the Bible in order to live by every pronouncement His Father made. He understood that the words on His scroll were words that "come from the mouth of God."

Second, Jesus read the word in order to trust God, not test God. "Again it is written, 'You shall not put the Lord your God to the test'" (verse 7). The Lord found in the Scriptures reason to believe God, to rely on Him. Facing Satan's temptation, he knew there

was a significant difference between trusting God and testing God. One humbles itself under the word of God; the other humbles the word under our desires. Jesus never sought to stand above God's word—always below it, in obedience to it, gladly. He trusted the Father as the word of God called Him to do so.

Third, Jesus read the word to clarify that God alone is God, to worship God properly. "Then Jesus said to him, 'Be gone, Satan! For it is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve'" (verse 10). It's possible to hear God's word while listening to and serving our idols. Isn't that what Satan was doing as he quoted the Scripture and asked Jesus to worship him? But not Jesus. He read the Bible as an act of worship. He found in the Bible reason to worship God alone. No rivals. No counterfeits. No idols. No exceptions. He purposed to serve the Father only. He read the word in order to bow to God. This is why the Devil leaves him in verse 11. There was nothing in Christ that could be satanically used to draw Him away from the true worship of the Father in order to trust anyone or anything else.

Until recently, I don't think I'd ever recognized just how God-focused Jesus was in this passage. The Lord's ears were glued to God's mouth (verse 4). His hopes rested on God's heart (verse 7). His service belonged to God's throne (verse 10). Each time the Lord applied the Scripture He actually applied himself to God.

Watching Jesus use the Scripture in Matthew 4 reminds me of several things I need to observe in my own Bible reading.

1. I need to learn to hang on every word of God. How often we find ourselves debating which parts of scripture apply? Yet it seems Jesus would have us debate not if they apply but how they apply. The if is settled. God speaks; we heed. Indeed, we ought to hang on every word, awaiting the life that comes from it. I too often read the Bible with an "I've read this before" or "I know what this says" attitude. I find it difficult to "hear again for the first time" and I find it all too easy to skim the words on the page in distraction. So I need to pray—more than I do—"Holy Spirit, let this next word be life to me! Let me feed on it like bread! Let me hear it as a word straight from the mouth of God!"

2. I need to recognize how critical to sanctification knowledge of God's word is. Jesus lives by every word of God. His reading translated into His living. That was critical in our Savior's temptation. Thus He was able to use a three-fold strategy for resisting demonic temptation: (1) Hide God's word in your heart so you can live by it; (2) Trust God completely so you don't take matters into your own hands; and, (3) worship the Lord God alone so you can refuse all idolatry.

3. I must give careful attention to proper interpretation. Have you ever noticed that Jesus was the first to quote scripture in this encounter with Satan (verse 4)? Then Satan follows up with a subtle twisting of God's word. Perhaps the Enemy would have been content to leave God's word out of the temptations had not the Lord raised it. But when Jesus quotes the Scripture,
